FROM THE PASTOR

Is unity in a congregation essential? St. Paul writes frequently of the division in the churches that he started and was their spiritual leader. His letter to the Corinthians spells it out; "Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you should be in agreement and that there should be no divisions among you, but that you should be united in the same mind and the same purpose." I Cor 1:10

I am also drawn to his passage about Holy Communion; "When you come together, it is not really to eat the Lord's supper. For when the time comes to eat, each of you goes ahead with your own supper, and one goes hungry and another becomes drunk. What! Do you not have homes to eat and drink in?" I Cor 11:20-22.

This seems so unusual to our modern ears. The people were bringing their own food and drink to the celebration but NOT sharing with those that had nothing. In worship we DO all share one bread and one body, as the song tells us. But should this idea of unity, or at least an attempt at unity, be one of our primary goals? Should this idea of unity be more than a literal understanding of bread and wine?

I would say most definitely yes, within our church, within our worship, within our council, with our neighbours in faith and with our Lutheran siblings in Christ. We are stronger as one body.

Is unity in a congregation essential, and where does it start?

<u>April 10th – Palm Sunday</u> 10:30 am with the procession of the palms plus the congregational participation in reading the Passion Story from Luke.

Food for thought: There are story elements in the Gospel of Luke that are different from the other three gospels:

- Jesus comes before Herod Antipas.
- Pilate did not think Jesus was guilty of any crime punishable by death.
- Jesus is not flogged

- No mocking by the soldiers
- Jesus and his disciples pray at the Mt. of Olives.
- The second bandit affirms Jesus's innocence and asks to be remembered and receives a blessing.
