

VISION STATEMENT

Trinity Lutheran Church is a community inspired by God to share Christ's good news by what we say and do.

I was inspired by the Advent word study we did in November 2019 from *The Bible Project* which explored the four Advent words.

The word **PEACE** is common in most languages. When people talk about peace treaties or times of peace, it usually means the absence of war. In the Bible, the word peace can refer to the absence of conflict, but it also points to the presence of something better in its place. Peace takes a lot of work because it's not just the absence of conflict. True peace requires taking what's broken and restoring it to wholeness, whether it is in our lives, our relationships, or in our world. And that's the rich biblical concept of peace. St. Paul instructed local churches to keep their unity through the bond of peace, which requires humility, patience and bearing with others in love. Becoming people of peace means participating in the life of Jesus who reconciled all things in heaven on earth, restoring peace through his death and resurrection. That's why Jesus came.



There are two main Hebrew words translated as **HOPE**. The first is yakhal, which means, "to wait for", like in the story of Noah and the ark

as the flood waters recede, Noah had to yakhal for weeks. The other word is qavah, which also means "to wait." It is related to the Hebrew word *QAV*, which means "cord." When you pull a *QAV* tight, you produce a state of tension until there's release. That's qavah: the feeling of tension and expectation while you wait for something to happen. Hopeful people in the Bible often recognize there is no evidence that things will get better, but yet they choose hope anyway. We find our hope in Jesus. **That's why Jesus came.**



When the Israelites were suffering from slavery in Egypt, God raised up Moses to lead them into freedom, and the first thing the Israelites did

was sing for **JOY**, even though they were in the middle of a desert. When the Apostle Paul was sitting in a dirty Roman prison, he could say that he has chosen joy even if he gets executed. He called this the "joy in the Lord." He believed it was a gift of God's Spirit, a sign that Jesus' presence is with you inspiring hope in the midst of hardship. Christian joy is a profound decision of faith and hope in the power of Jesus' own life and love. **That's why Jesus came.**



Jesus taught that genuine **LOVE** for God and others means seeking people's well-being without expecting anything in return, especially from

people who are in difficult situations who can't repay you even if they wanted to. According to Jesus, this kind of generous **love** reflects the very heartbeat of God. When he eventually marched into Jerusalem, he made himself an enemy of the leaders of his people by accusing them of hypocrisy and corruption. But then, instead of attacking his enemies to overthrow them, he allowed them to kill him. Jesus died for the selfishness and corruption of his enemies because he loved them. **That's why Jesus came.**

(Council discussed the above and felt it best to only hold the Christmas Eve & Christmas Day Services. Everyone felt three consecutive days of services would be a little much. We pray you understand & agree with our decision.)



Effective **December 1st**, Trinity Lutheran Church is requiring anyone twelve years of age and older entering the church to show proof of double vaccination. You will need to show your driver's license or health card and either the document you received after your second dose or the Passport Vaccination document with the OR code on it.

When you show us the card the first time, your name will be placed on our Proof of Vaccination List so that each time you attend Trinity, you just need to provide the greeter with your name so they can check the list. By gathering this information, we are able to fully open Trinity without the occupancy restrictions. We are hoping this will allow us a wonderful Christmas Eve service where more people are able to come out and enjoy the evening of carols and hymns.

It is beginning to look a lot like Christmas. There is snow on the ground and the temperature sure has dropped and we are only one month away from Christmas. We hope everyone is safe, warm and doing well.

RETURN TO IN-PERSON WORSHIP

Trinity has returned to in-person worship and will be holding at least once monthly, possibly twice, communion. We are still required to wear our masks through the entire service and continue to follow the Middlesex Health Unit and Ontario Government guidelines. We are still asking everyone to sign in when you arrive providing your name and telephone number.

Our services are available both in-person and live worship services on-line. We are working on the purchase of the equipment approved so that our sound quality will improve and those at home will hear us much more clearly and louder.

CHILDREN'S PAGEANT

We will be holding a very condensed Christmas Pageant on **December 12**th with only a few of our children participating. Unfortunately, there was just not enough time to be able to include those at home in our live streaming and in person service. We will certainly miss those who were not able to attend and look forward to 2022 when hopefully everyone is back at Trinity.

MUSIC AT TRINITY

IN THE BLEAK MIDWINTER:



We have all sung this beautiful Christmas carol at some point in time. It started out as a poem written by Christina Rossetti, first published in 1872 in Scribner's Monthly. In 1906 Gustav Holst set the poem to music. In 1909, Harold Darke arranged the choral setting sung by choirs everywhere. In 2008, a poll taken by choirmasters and choral experts the world over, said this carol was the best Christmas carol ever written.

Now Jacob Collier from the UK has come along. Jacob is a musician and singer who possesses a level of genius from another planet above anybody else these days. He now is only about 24 years of age and has already won four Grammy awards. He is blessed with a degree of understanding musical harmony and pitch unlike anybody else and has perfect pitch. He has taken this carol and as an unaccompanied singer recorded this in ten-part harmony. He sings all ten parts himself, one part at a time with multi-track recording of sound and video. His sense of harmony is quite simply... mind blowing.

I invite you to go to Google and type in IN THE BLEAK MIDWINTER - JACOB COLLIER and have a listen.

There are also many other titles Jacob has done from George Gershwin to pop contemporary songs. He has opened for the renowned jazz man Quincy Jones. He has given talks and lectures at American University music schools of high repute, on music harmony and composition. He has captured the attention of music educators and students by storm. Give yourself a lift from the 'Bleak Mid Winter Covid', we are all trying to survive. Merry Christmas to all of you!
